

2006-2007 YEARS IN REVIEW

In 2006, the Metropolitan Police Department, City of St. Louis initiated new programs in an effort to reduce crime and gang membership in the city of St. Louis and to expand resources available to victims. The Department, in conjunction with Area Resources for Community and Human Services (ARCHS) received a U.S. Department of Justice Grant for the formation of the Gang Resistance Education and Training (GREAT) program in St. Louis. The GREAT program is offered in elementary and middle schools in neighborhoods with high gang visibility and is facilitated by nine law enforcement officers. GREAT serves to deter children from future delinquency, violence and gang membership by providing the necessary life skills to avoid dangerous behavior.

That year, ARCHS' on-line directory was made available to all Department employees, and was made accessible to patrol officers from the computers in their patrol cars. With patrol officers having access from their vehicles, they are instantly able to provide counseling assistance to victims of crime. The directory contains more than 300 St. Louis City and County agencies including those that assist with Domestic Violence, Homeless Services, Substance Abuse and Youth Services. Since it is continually updated with pertinent contact information, officers have a wealth of resources at their fingertips, allowing them to better assist not only crime victims, but all St. Louis citizens.

The Department partnered with the St. Louis Family Violence Council (FVC) and several social service agencies in 2006, to form the Family Justice Center, which was later renamed the Circle of Safety (COS). St. Louis received a \$1.3 million grant to start the center. The center operates as a program of the COS at a single location to assist domestic violence victims. Advocacy, Order of Protection assistance, counseling, civil and legal help and emergency placement are among the services offered. Detectives from the Domestic Abuse Response Team are on-site to provide police assistance to victims when needed. Nearly 2,500 victims, whom the COS calls "guests," have visited the center since its inception. District officers are encouraged to offer the center and its resources to victims who are in need of assistance.

The Department also honored two fallen officers with official recognition on the Officer's Memorial. Many years after their deaths, it was determined that the two officers had officially died in the line of duty. Michael J. Burke was killed on December 13, 1901. He was electrocuted while attempting to make a call to other officers from a telephone box following a storm. He was a 14-year veteran of the Department. Edward T. Burke, an 18-year veteran of the Department and grandson of Michael J. Burke, died on January 1, 1953. He was escorting a prisoner when he fell down a staircase. Both men received a

permanent honor in 2006, when their names were inscribed on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C.

The start of 2007 brought with it two new crime initiatives for the Metropolitan Police Department, City of St. Louis. In January, the Department unveiled plans for the formation of the Crime Suppression Unit (CSU) and Crime Analysis Unit (CAU), both aimed at reducing crime in the city of St. Louis. The Crime Suppression Unit targets areas that are deemed "hot spots" due to high levels of criminal activity. The CSU also targets career criminals. This tactical unit, comprised of more than 50 police officers, worked in a variety of neighborhoods in its first year of operation and had impressive results. In 2007, the CSU made 1,625 arrests, seized 257 weapons and recovered 359 stolen vehicles. The Crime Analysis Unit is staffed by a combination of commissioned and civilian crime analysts who, using statistics and state-of-the-art mapping equipment, produce information to help the Department better locate and target high crime areas.

These initiatives and other successful Department practices assisted in the Department earning accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) during 2007. During the accreditation process, all aspects of the Department's policies, procedures, management, operations

and support services were examined by CALEA. This accreditation serves to further exemplify the fine work Department officers and employees perform on a daily basis to provide the best possible police service to St. Louis citizens.

Additional resources for officers were also made available in 2007. In July, the Department announced the formation of the St. Louis Police Foundation. This foundation serves as a conduit for the business and private sectors to support the Department through monetary aid, services and goods. Its goal is to provide the Department with tools that will assist in providing the highest level of police service to the community. In 2007, the Police Foundation assisted with support for the Department's Canine, Mounted Patrol and Hostage Response Units.


In December, the Department took additional measures to remove guns from the streets when the Sixth District sponsored a successful Gun Buy Back Program. Citizens were offered the opportunity to voluntarily turn over guns in exchange for \$100 for assault-type weapons and \$50 for revolvers and shotguns. The program was paid for with monies seized as a result of criminal enterprises. Several community sponsors also donated advertising and other services, all in a combined effort to reduce the possibility of firearms falling into the hands of a criminal. Citizens turned in

536 weapons, including one semi-automatic machine gun, 127 rifles, 161 shotguns and 247 semi-automatic revolvers.

In 2007, the Department honored Police Officer Michael Barwick, who died in August of 2002, when his patrol car was involved in an accident. The Missouri State Legislature passed a resolution to honor Officer Barwick and Department employees joined local and state officials in October of 2007 when a stretch of Interstate 44 was named in his honor.

Sadly, this was not the only time the Department would honor a fallen officer. On February 21, 2007, Police Officer Stephen Jerabek had a fatal heart attack following completion of the Department's annual fitness test. Jerabek was a 30-year veteran of the Department. Then just six months later, on August 15, 2007, the Department experienced another loss. Officer Norvelle Brown was shot and killed while on patrol in the Seventh District. Officer Brown was a one-year veteran of the Department. On August 17, 2007, a fifteen-year-old male and an eighteen-year-old male accomplice were arrested and charged.

In the line of duty



OFFICER STEPHEN R. JERABEK

Officer Stephen Jerabek was 60 years old when he suffered a heart attack in the St. Louis Police Academy gymnasium. On February 21, 2007, Officer Jerabek had just completed the Department's annual physical fitness test when he collapsed. He was rushed to a hospital where he was later pronounced dead. Officer Jerabek served the Metropolitan Police Department honorably for thirty years. Officer Jerabek is survived by his wife, Mary Anne and three adult children.



OFFICER NORVELLE T. BROWN

Officer Norvelle Brown was 22 years old when he was shot and killed in the line of duty. On August 15, 2007, Officer Brown was attempting to apprehend a suspect on Semple Avenue when he was shot in the chest. Officer Brown was wearing a bullet resistant vest, but the bullet entered through the arm opening, causing a fatal wound. Officer Brown was able to radio that he needed assistance. An undercover officer, who arrived at the scene just moments after Officer Brown's radio call, placed Officer Brown in a squad car and rushed him to the hospital. Officer Brown succumbed to his injuries. At the time of his death, Officer Brown was assigned to the Seventh District and had served the Metropolitan Police Department honorably for one year. In an effort to honor his commitment to serve the city's Seventh District, the "Norvelle Brown 7th District Scholarship" was established.




